Welcome to Japanese 1020!

Japanese 2010 is a basic course offered to students who have completed Japanese 1020 or who demonstrate the equivalent skills as those who have completed 1020. In this course, you will learn basic skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, as well as the understanding of the culture relevant to language functions and communication, balancing all four skills to provide a solid foundation for further language study. The course also emphasizes the development of various communicative skills to minimize reliance on using English in the classroom. The class will be conducted through interactive group activities, lectures, and assignments.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following in simple Japanese:

Speaking and listening skills:

- ✓ Describe foods, beverages, restaurants and cooking
- ✓ Explain about shops, stores, shopping and clothing
- ✓ Explain about and describe travel, transportation, and sightseeing
- ✓ Talk about travel schedules
- ✓ Express experiences, desire, and opinion
- ✓ Talk about houses, furnishings, appliances, and household chores
- ✓ Talk about giving and receiving
- ✓ Make a suggestion
- ✓ Express permission and purpose
- ✓ Make request
- ✓ Offer advice

Reading skills:

- ✓ Read the authentic materials more comfortably for a general idea as well as for specific information: restaurant guide, magazine articles; itinerary; hotel advertisements, post cards, train time tables, travel guides, and housing advertisements.

Writing skills:

- ✓ Write a short paragraph about their eating habits and meals, an advertisement of clothing stores, a short article about a place they live or they are familiar with for a tourist guide book, a post card to their friend.

Class Rules

1. Class participation policy:

It is essential that you keep up with course work on a daily basis and participate all classes. You are responsible for any announcements made or information presented in class.

2. Homework policy:

All assignments are consistent to what you learn in the class on the day. It is important, therefore, to complete all assigned homework on the day for your progress. Late work may be submitted no later than one week after the deadline with 20% point deduction.

3. Group-work policy:

You are encouraged to work with your classmates on home assignments. However, you are not allowed to copy each other's homework. If you study together on your homework and decide on the same answers, please write down on the homework sheet, "I have worked with so-and-so to do this assignment," and both of you sign and date the work.

4. Make-up policy:

An opportunity to make-up on only one quiz or test will be given to all students regardless of reasons or excuse.

5. Write neatly:

Use a sharp pencil, and write and erase (with an eraser, not crossing out with pen) carefully. Learn to pay close attention to detail.

6. No chewing gum or food in class:

Food and drink are allowed only by special permission.

7. Turn off or turn on silent mode your cellular phone during the class unless you are expecting an extremely important phone call. If your cellular phone rings during class, the instructor will take your device away and return it to you after class. Please help keep the classroom a distraction-free learning environment.

Tutoring Attendance (15%)

Students are required to go to the tutoring room to practice sentence expressions and conversations with the tutors once a week. The tutoring room is located on the fourth floor of the Geology Building 415. It is closed during the first week. Students should start this learning activity some time during the second week. The instructor will announce the detailed drills in a file titled “the Weekly,” which will be posted on the Canvas at the beginning of each week. The activities with the tutors are important and helpful, especially, for the beginners, to become familiar with the Japanese sounds and improve their speaking and listening skills. Therefore, the tutors will sign when the students complete each assignment. The instructor will take a look at the tutors’ signs on the Weekly sheets and converted them into a portion of the students’ final grades.

Homework/Portfolio (15%)

The instructor posts a file called “Kyoo-no Shukudai (Today’s homework)” on the Canvas. This is an everyday task that each student should turn in at the beginning of each class. When your homework is returned, please file it so that you can study before quizzes and chapter tests. The students have to write their answers neatly and consult the tutors or the instructor when they cannot find answers.

Students ought to create their portfolios, which contain the following items in order: 1) Weeklies (tutoring attendance sheets,) 2) Worksheet Assignments, 3) Tests, 4) Quizzes, and 5) the other materials given in class. Each student should submit his/her portfolio when he/she takes the last chapter test during the finals week.

Three Chapter Tests

Students are required to take three 50 minutes tests in class. Because the dates depend on how well the class activities go, they are tentative. Students will be informed when to take the test by the instructor later in class.

Hands-on Learning Activities

In addition to the above, you are required to participate in a cooking activity. The detailed information, such as date and recipe, will be given later in class.
