Goals & Objectives:

Students will gain listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in standard (Mandarin) Chinese, attaining approximately the **Novice-High** to **Intermediate-Low** level on the ACTFL Can-Do Benchmark & Statements with proficiency scale. Specifically, students will be able to achieve the following:

Listening

Able to understand sentence-length utterances that consist of recombination of learned elements in a limited number of content areas, particularly if strongly supported by the situational context. Can understand topics beyond a variety of survival needs. Comprehension areas include such basic needs as getting meals, lodging, and transportation, and receiving simple instructions and routine commands.

Speaking

Able to handle successfully a variety of uncomplicated, basic, and communicative tasks and social situations. Can talk simply about self and perform such tasks as ordering a meal, asking directions, and making purchases. Can ask and answer questions and participate in conversations on topics on the most immediate needs, e.g., personal history, leisure time activities, and simple transactions.

Reading

Can read, for basic survival and social needs, simple connected, specially-prepared discourse for informative purposes and can puzzle out pieces of some authentic material with considerable difficulty and/or to high-frequency oral vocabulary and structure. Understands main ideas in material and puzzle out simple messages, personal notes and very short letters that are written by native speaker used to dealing with foreigners.

Writing

Able to meet a number of practical writing needs. Can write short messages, simple letters, and take down simple notes. Can create statements involving personal preferences, daily routine, everyday events, and other topics grounded in personal experience. Material produced consists of recombination of learned vocabulary and structures into simple sentences on very familiar topics.

The purposes of incorporating facebook page to this course as a community are sharing and solving problems. We have to share ONE post regarding Chinese EACH WEEK and comment TWO posts from your peers at least. I will also share last minute updates/reminders regarding our class or tips for exams if it is necessary. This is counted in your online participation.

Comprehension Quizzes (CQ)

Every Monday we start a new lesson. Before coming to class you are expected to have read the lesson and completed the comprehension quiz. Comprehension quizzes will include both questions from the text and from the grammar section.

Character Writing Assignment (CW)

Practice the *individual characters* and *vocabulary* in each lesson. The practice sheets are online. The CW due date will be on the following Tuesday. Two ways to submit the practice sheets: 1) print it out and turn it in class; 2) upload on canvas.

Dictation Quizzes (DQ)

On the following Tuesday or Wednesday, depending on the week, there will be a dictation quiz at the beginning of class. Each lesson has roughly 25 new vocabulary words. I will read 10 of these words at random, you will have to write the character.

Review Game (RG)

A group of 2-3 people will conduct a review game of the selected lesson from the textbook on Monday. You could create a short study guide or focus on a couple of vocabularies, grammar points, or sentences which you consider are the important contents to your classmates. The length should be 10-12 minutes (*Please see the separate file of guideline and rubric*).

Article Writing Assignments (AW)

There will be four article writing assignments during the semester. On Monday, I will assign a topic and character limit for the writing assignment. Writing assignments are due on Friday. They will range from 100-200 words, they must be handwritten. Topics will be related to the lesson being studied.

Storytelling Project (ST)

You will write a personal story of a book by individual or pair work, record the story by your voice and edit it with pictures or video. Projects will be presented at the end of the semester. More details will come later on in the semester (*Please see the separate file of guideline and rubric*).
